

Alaska Laws protect a person's right to go barefoot due to a religious, cultural, medical or disability reasons. State and Federal Law protect your right to go barefoot in public places such as restaurants, grocery stores, theaters, govt buildings, gyms, museums, libraries, amusement parks, trains or buses. No one, including business owners or employees can tell a barefoot patron to leave, or to put on shoes. (AS 18.35). Risks to the barefoot patron or annoyance to staff and customers are NOT reasons to discriminate.
